MARCH 23, 1998

VERA ANGASAN: Another one, too, like qanganaruaqs?

MARY JANE NIELSEN: Qanganaruaqs are yarrow. They're like a squirrel's tail.

PAT PARTNOW: Qanganaruaq. Yarrow.

MARY JANE NIELSEN: That mean's squirrel's, just like a squirrel's tail.

PAT PARTNOW: And what do you use those for?

VERA ANGASAN: They use 'em for cuts.

PAT PARTNOW: So you'd like boil 'em up and make a paste?

VERA ANGASAN: They put boiling water and keep soaking 'em, then they put 'em in a cut.

PAT PARTNOW: They smell real good.
